I'm Free To Please...?

Read Psalm 11 and Romans 6: 1-7: 6

Why are we so prone to run anywhere but to the Lord?

...he (THE LORD) is on his throne, a judge of the rebellious and a refuge for the trusting. (Michael Wilcock on Ps 11: 7) Does this comfort or scare you?

The important thing is *altitude*, not *location*. (Michael Wilcock on Ps 11: 1-3)

What does Ps 11: 4a and 4b mean for your Christian faith? (Read Hab 2: 19 after you answer)

Then discuss: It is, again, not a matter of location; it is a matter of function. (Michael Wilcock)

What is the relation between Ps 11: 4c-6 and Rom 6: 1-7: 6?

Discuss Joni Eareckson Tada's comments on Rom 7: 5-6: Thank God, we have been released to serve the Lord in the new way of the Spirit and not in the old way of the written code. We serve Jesus; we don't serve a list of rules. This is exactly why we should stop using words like victory and defeat to describe our obedience. We are never defeated by this or that sin. Rather, we are obedient or disobedient to the Lord.

So how do we control sin in our lives? (Rom 6: 12-14)

Christian believers are identified with Christ Jesus in what ways?

Why do the crises of life bring challenges to our confidence? Discuss. (Based on thoughts by Peter Craigie)

Dealing With Your Past

Read Numbers 11: 1-9 and Philipp	oians 3	5: 1-16
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Does intercessory or petitionary prayer always stop the Lord's judgement or actions?

If no; then why pray?

The weeping of Israel is a failure of faith in God. (James Mays) Discuss.

Why does the food of slavery seem better than the fare of freedom? (Based on James Mays)

Why do we complain even though the Lord provides salvation and everything we need?

Discuss why it is that a murmuring, complaining, critical spirit renders us progressively incapable of rising to our divine calling. (Based on James Philip)

Then discuss why the Lord accepts our complaints such as in Ps 142: 2; but comes down so hard at other times as in Num 11: 1-3 (etc).

And discuss Phillip Budd's comment on the rejection of the manna: ...this is culpable discontent arising from what is judged to be a monotonous diet.

Why does Christian aspiration have the tendency to develop into either dismay (I'll never make it) or perfectionism (I've made it)?

Read Philippians 3: 12-14 and discuss

- how it is possible to catch the One who has already caught you.
- the need for each believer to deal with their past in the sense highlighted in these verses
- why the past has such influence on their present and future

Then, why is dealing with your past to involve you learning from repenting of, praising the Lord for, and forgetting your past?

Both passages highlight aspects of memory. Why are the retentive, defective, and selective aspects of so prone to sinful exploitation?

State what it means for you to learn that the *prize* you are to reach for, ^{(Pnil 3:} 14) is your *qiff* from the Lord and *awarded* to you because of Jesus not because of what you've achieved.






"Anyone who lives on milk, being still an infant, is not acquainted with the teaching about righteousness."

(1 Corinthians)

There's a call in the Gospel for simple 'child like' trust in God. But never a simplistic 'childish' one either. We need to grow up into maturity in Christ, never being content with the status quo until we see Jesus face to face. There is so much for us to get on with in Christ. But sometimes we opt for 'play ground behavior' and wonder why our relationship with God is going nowhere.

This series of studies follows the 9 and 10 30 Church talks in the second 1/2 of term 3. They are an attempt to get us to think about where we are at in our relationship with Jesus. Are we still throwing tantrums like a toddler or meandering about like a love sick teenager? How can we take some steps to really get our teeth into the meat of the faith?

Hints for these studies – with each question, sometimes there's a follow up question or two included at the same number. This is to just help draw it out a bit more. You may get it with the first one so don't panic if you end up saying the same thing in thinking about the follow up question—so just move on. Also, don't panic if you can't quite see what a question might be driving at. These questions are just an are not the Bible. Feel free to move onto the next one. The questions are just an attempt to help us get into the passage/issue. Let the passage drive things at the end of the day. The questions are of course still meant to be a lead in to what could be very important with what God has in front of us here.
