4) Why is it comforting that our heavenly Father knows that we need "such things" as what we eat, wear and drink?
5) When do you think worry might be a sign of "little faith"? (v28) Do you think it always is?
6) Is there a difference between concern and worry?

Read Luke 12:32-34 7) List all the things which Jesus tells his disciples to do in these verses. 8) How many of them should we do? Why or why not? 9) What sorts of things in our lives show where "our heart is"? Think it over • Consider the song/phrase, "Don't worry, be happy." How are Jesus' words different from that? • Do you find Jesus' words in this passage more of a challenge or a comfort? Why?

2) What do you think the paralysed man's friends are expecting Jesus to do?

Read Luke 5:20-21

3) Imagine you are the paralysed man being lowered before Jesus. How would you feel when Jesus announces, "Friend, your sins are forgiven." (v20)

4) Why does Jesus' declaration make the Pharisees angry? Are they correct in their logic?

5) Why does Jesus heal the man? 6) In what ways does Jesus' healing the man answer the criticism of the Pharisees and teachers of the law? 7) This is the very first time in Luke's gospel that Jesus calls himself "the Son of Man." Why do you think he chooses now to use that phrase? (you might like to think back to last year and what we discovered about the Son of Man in Daniel, cf Daniel 7:13-14) Think it over • If you had to pick a climactic verse in this passage, which one would it be? • What aspects of Jesus' personality are on display in this passage? What aspects do you find reassuring? Are there any aspects that you find unsettling? • In this section Jesus seems to be operating on a different priority system to everyone else. Do you ever wish that His priority system was different? If so, how so? • What are some practical ways we can use this passage to help comfort each other and the wider

community in the current COVID-19 crisis?
